JN Burnett MEC Students Ecart Challenge



This past month, Manufacturing and Engineering Coop (MEC) students worked on creating an electric go-kart from a kit provided by Edison Motors and sponsored by Silverback Transport. Under the guidance of teacher Wesley Bevan, the team met the deadline with just enough time for a test drive before transporting the go-kart to Merritt, BC, for the challenge at the rodeo grounds. The building process was hectic, with students designing the kart shortly before spring break and starting construction soon after returning to school. They worked in Burnett's metal shop, welding, cutting, measuring, and adjusting to create a fully functioning go-kart, complete with panels painted by Vancouver Community College's Auto Collision department.

On May 25th, a group of MEC students (Adam Yetbarek, Areeba Saqib, Hayden Siuhay, Lucia De Gros, Mark Bevan, Youssef Alsharif, and Zackary Langlois-Matias), along with parents and Mr. Bevan, traveled to Merritt. They arrived at 9:30 a.m. to set up and get organized before the challenges began at 11:00 a.m. Throughout the day, they competed in various events, including an obstacle course, an off-roading course, a tractor pull, and a speed course.

After the official events, teachers raced their students' karts for ten laps around the obstacle/speed course. Most teams, including MEC, had their karts run out of battery before completing all the laps and had to wheel themselves off the course. Despite this, the experience was amazing and well worth the effort. MEC hopes to participate in Edison's electric go-karting challenge again next year.

- clothing and footwear required for sports and school activities



Richmond SD 38 "Manufacturing & Engineering Co-op" program (MEC) has spots remaining for our semester two district program for next year (Feb-June 2025)

This Co-op program will provide students the opportunity to learn "real world" skills, connect students with industry and employers, and to engage in a program that provides them with learning for easy transitioning to post-secondary-related programs.

As indicated in the chart below, students attend:

- home school in semester one
- the MEC program in semester two at Burnett Secondary (all day)

(MacNeill and RHS students would need to change to a semester school - Burnett if there is room.)

Course Schedule:

Semester 1 Courses – Home School	Semester 2 – MEC at Burnett Secondary
These are selected by you via your school's program planning process.	You are registered in these courses for MEC.
Course 1 – you select	Engineering (ENG 11A) – 4 credits
Course 2 – you select	Youth Explore Trades Skills (STX 12A) – 4 credits
Course 3 – you select	MEC Work Experience (WEX 12A) – 4 credits
Course 4 – you select	Work Force Training Certificate (WTC 12) – 4 credits

This program has both a focus on manufacturing and engineering. Students will learn about trades skills in the STX course, engineering in the ENG course, and from there, student WEX placements can be focussed on one or both options (student may choose the focus).

The Work Force Training Certificate (WTC) is offered at a significant savings via Northwest Skills Institute. They are offering access to their entire course catalogue at a massive discount. The certificate fee is \$500.00 (a savings of at least \$1000-\$3000), and students may choose from several certificates, including:

- Drafting and CAD Technician
- CNC Lathe Production Technician
- Advanced Manufacturing Technician
- Mechatronics & Industrial Automation Technician + many more to select from!

From the NW Skills catalogue, students may also "cherry pick" from skills-based courses, which include:

- Engineering Drawings
- Hydraulics
- Robotics
- Welding
- Aerospace Manufacturing

Students will have opportunities to hear from post-secondary guest speakers and participate in field trips to post-secondary and industry training sites.




