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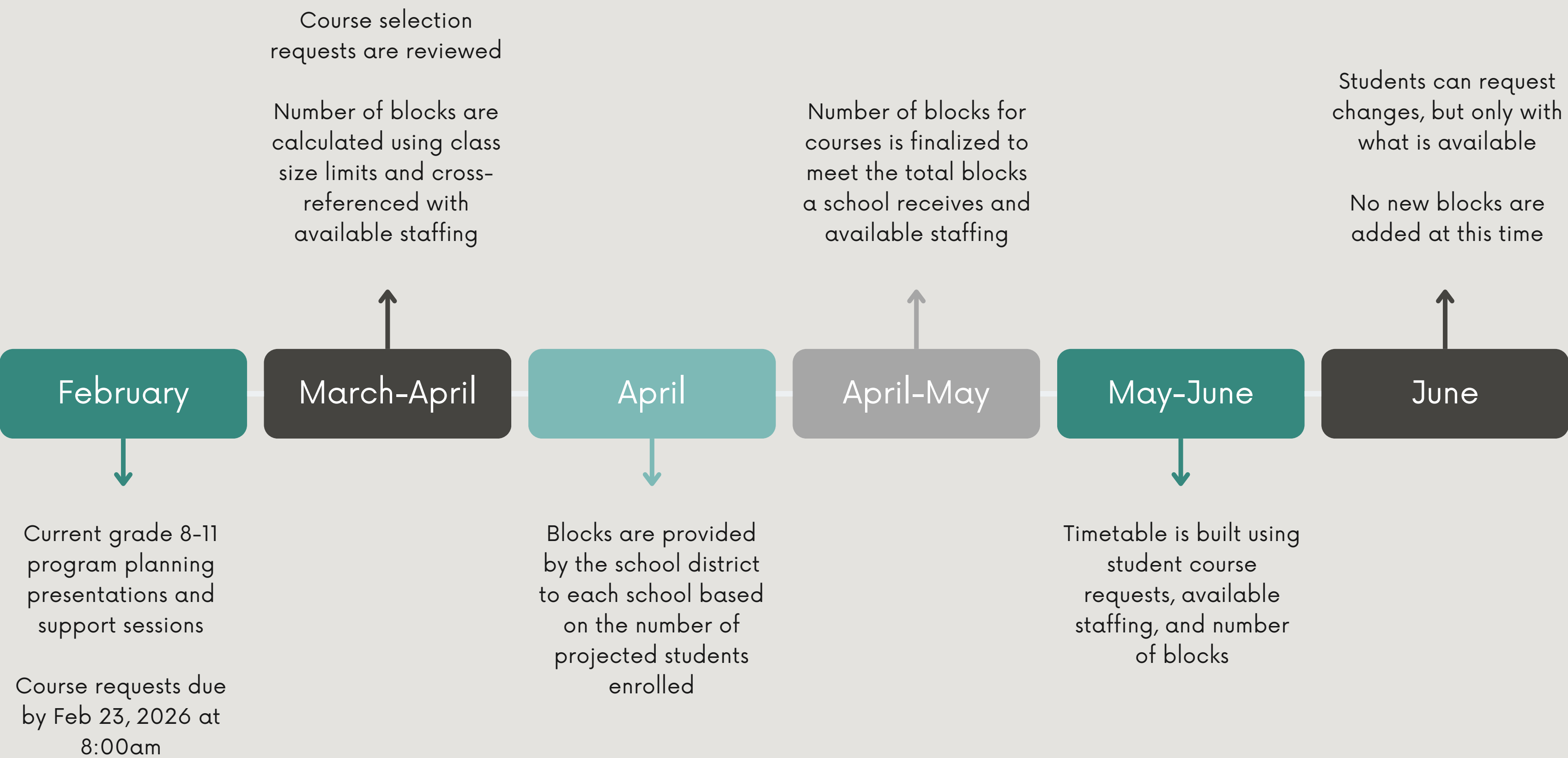

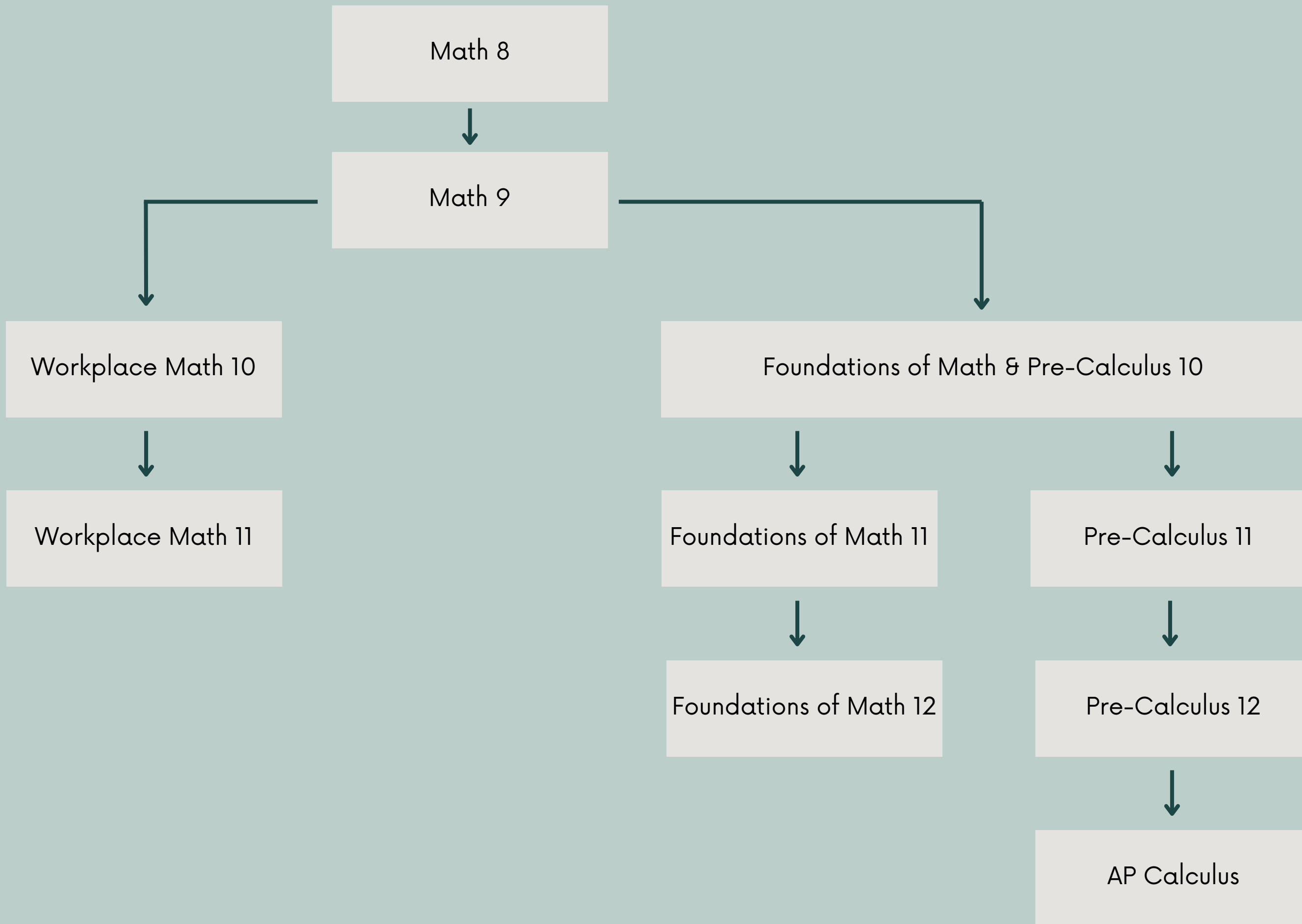

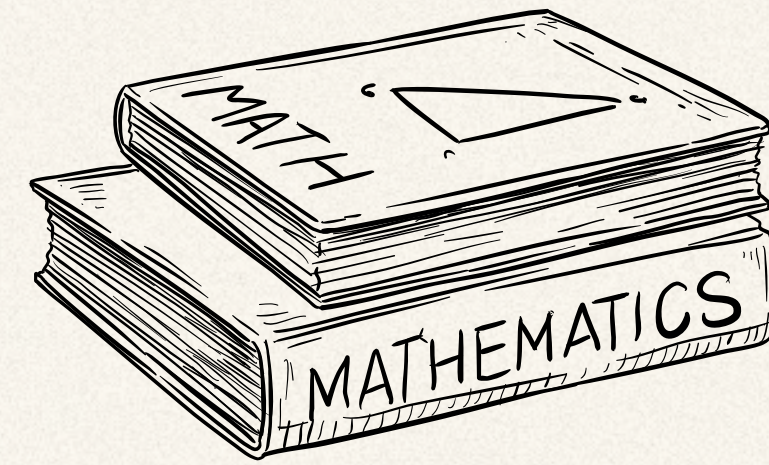

PRE-CALCULUS 11 ENRICHED

- Enriches regular math 11 curriculum
- Major emphasis on problem-solving
- Includes topics outside of curriculum

PRE-CALCULUS 11

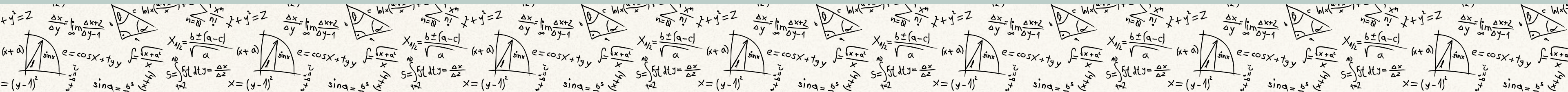
- topics include: financial literacy, absolute value, radical, quadratic, and rational equations and inequalities, polynomial factoring, sequences of series, trigonometry
- for post-secondary programs requiring Calculus

FOUNDATIONS 11

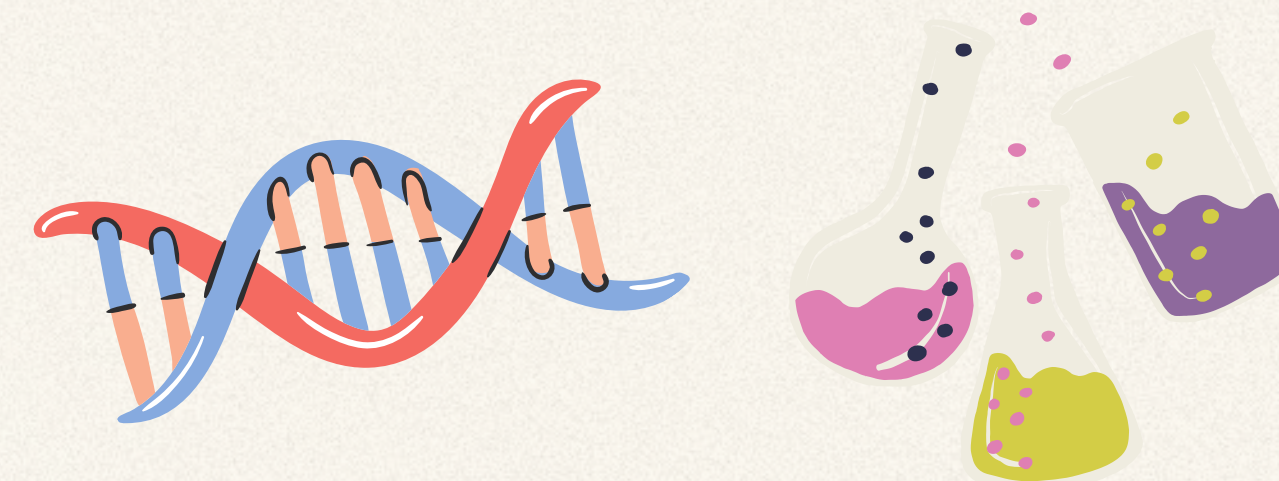
- topics include: financial literacy, logical reasoning, optimization, systems of equations, quadratic functions, application of statistics
- for post-secondary programs not requiring Calculus
- university admissions may require Foundations 12

WORKPLACE 11

- topics include: financial literacy, rate of change, probability and statistics in various contexts, interpreting graphs in society, 3D shapes
- Intended for those interested in trades or college programs not requiring math



SCIENCE COURSE



CHEMISTRY 11

- topics include: organic chemistry, atomic structure, periodic trends, bonding and forces of attraction, chemical reactions, moles, stoichiometry and solutions

LIFE SCIENCES 11

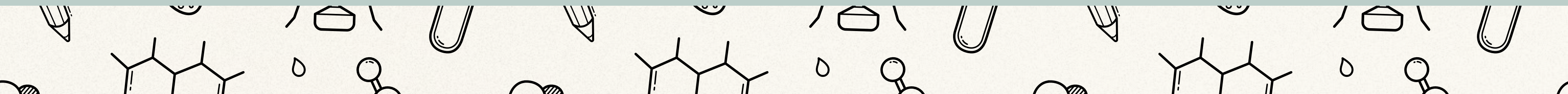
- topics include: characteristics of living things, process of evolution, taxonomy
- includes laboratory work, there are alternatives to dissection labs

PHYSICS 11

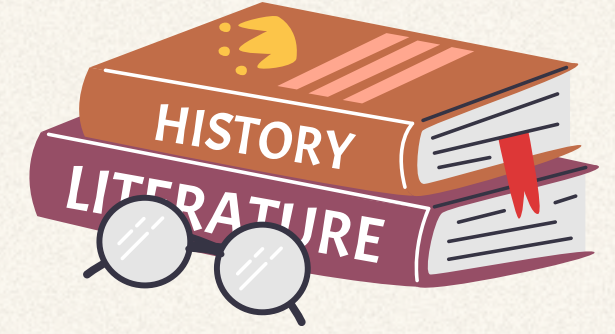
- topics include: classical Newtonian mechanics, mechanical and thermal energy, electric circuits and waves.
- include qualitative and quantitative labs

SCIENCES FOR CITIZENS 11

- topics include: how science impacts daily lives, science in the workplace, interaction of human and natural systems
- intended for students planning to attend technical schools, trade school and college

BC FIRST PEOPLES STUDIES 12

- study of history, traditions and cultures of BC First Peoples
- examines ongoing impacts of colonialism and self-determination movements

PHYSICAL GEOGRAPHY 12

- interconnectedness of natural and human worlds
- includes geographic inquiry process and geographic literacy skills

LAW STUDIES 12

- introduction to the impact of law on daily life and various legal systems
- may include field trip to law courts, mock trials etc.

SOCIAL JUSTICE 12

- aims to increase student awareness of social injustice and provides knowledge, skills, and ethical framework to advocate for a socially just world

TWENTIETH CENTURY WORLD HISTORY 12

- deepen historical thinking by examining the major events of the twentieth century using tools such as cause and effect, and historical inquiry



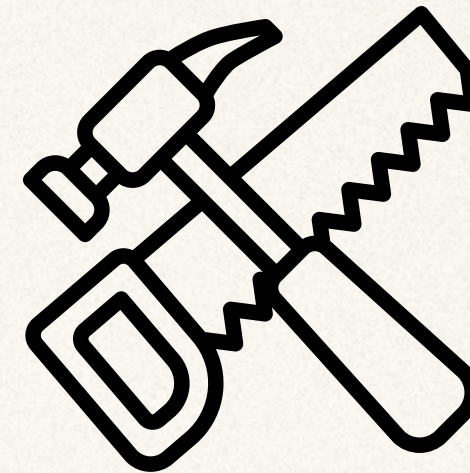

- includes focus on fashion trends, design elements, marketing as well as environmental impacts



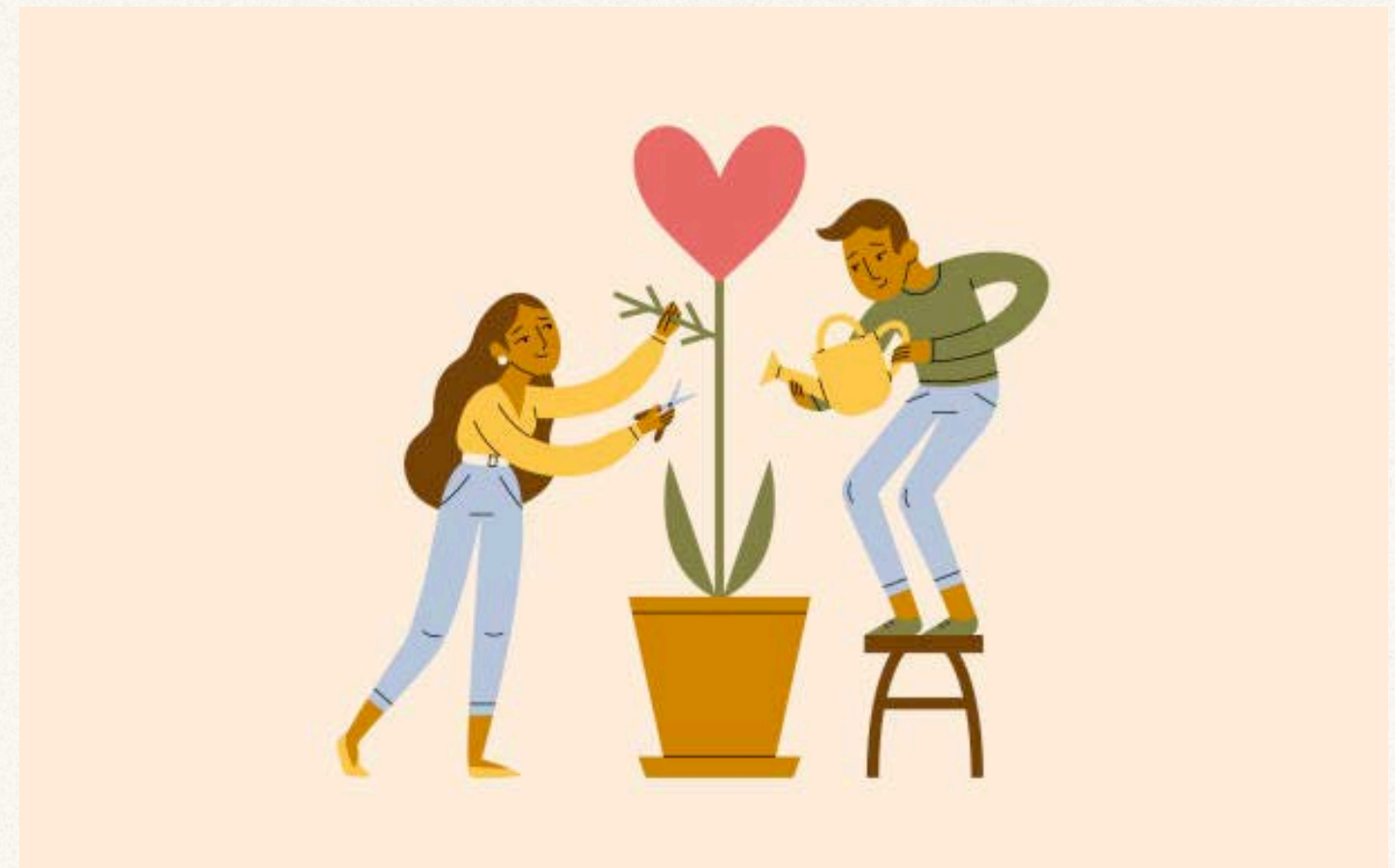

ACTIVE LIVING

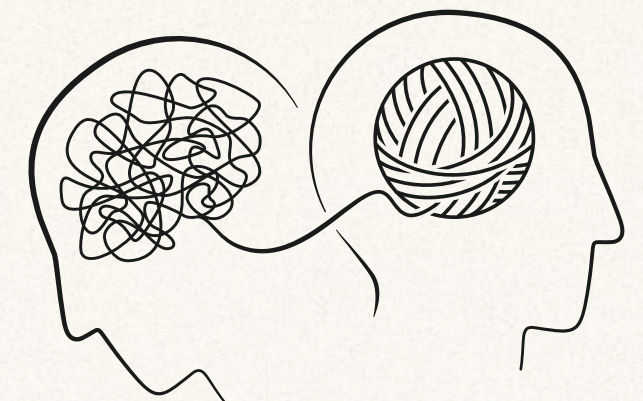
- builds on skills acquired in Grades 8-10
